

## Curricular Innovation

No one thrives in a silo—least of all musicians. Because of your generosity, NEC's **Integrative Curriculum** is reinventing conservatory education by forging fresh intersections among musical genres and disciplines.

We have laid the groundwork for initiatives that will expand the parameters of music education. As part of the integrative curriculum, faculty members Miriam Fried (violin) and Andrew Schartmann (music theory) created a new course called Performance and Analysis: Beethoven's Violin Sonatas, in which students examine how music theory relates to performance and how historical context can inform our interpretations of music. Thanks to this reimagined approach to teaching, students will graduate as holistic musicians with the professional tools and creative confidence to transform their careers and the wider world.

Through a generous planned gift, Dr. Joni has also included NEC in her estate plans to supplement the endowment and ensure the ICA's success well into the future.

Other notable support came from the Richard K. Lubin Family Foundation to endow the Nancy and Richard Lubin Institute for Concert Artists Scholarship Fund, which supports ICA students through studio lessons and coaching, a living stipend, and professional development opportunities. These extraordinary gifts will enable artists to emerge comprehensively equipped to navigate the demands of a professional career with confidence and vision.

## Access to Music Education

## **Teaching Artistry and Music Education**

The Teaching Artistry and Music Education concentration offers a suite of courses, fellowships, workshops, and capstone projects that prepare students for teaching opportunities across age ranges, backgrounds, and musical genres. A generous gift from Margarita Rudyak has been instrumental in the ongoing development and growth of Teaching Artistry at NEC. Margarita, a current member of NEC's President's Council, served for many years as a mentor to NEC students and was a critical supporter in the creation of the Student Life and Performance Center and the Rudyak Reading Room in the Blumenthal Family Library.



## Chamber Music Intensive Performance Seminar

For more than a decade, NEC Prep's Chamber Music Intensive Performance Seminar (CHIPS) has provided exceptional young string and piano students an in-depth, one-of-a-kind chamber music immersion experience. In June, the program's founding donors made a remarkable pledge to fully fund CHIPS, allowing advanced musicians ages 13 to 18 to participate tuitionfree in perpetuity. Their generosity will increase faculty support, expand learning opportunities, and establish summer chamber music programming, making NEC the preeminent provider of year-round programming for young chamber musicians.



## The Early Childhood Music Education Pilot

Made possible through an anonymous gift, the Early **Childhood Music Education Pilot** offered its first full academic year of programming in 2023-2024, in partnership with ABCD Head Start, Ellis Early Learning, and the City of Boston. The program reached approximately 560 infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and pre-K students in 43 classrooms across five early childhood centers in Dorchester, Mattapan, South End, and Jamaica Plain. Our three founding teaching artists collectively taught more than 1,400 hours over 31 weeks, providing high-quality music-making experiences that included singing, creative movement, instrument play, and age-appropriate explorations of foundational music concepts.
