Director's Summary

The story of Purcell's Dido and Aeneas has its roots in the events described in the Aeneid by Virgil. Dido, Queen of Carthage, still mourning the loss of her first husband, meets Aeneas the Trojan hero on his way to Italy to found the new city of Rome. Dido's lady-in-waiting convinces Dido to allow Aeneas to woo her. In Purcell's opera, we move to a scene of the Sorceress and the Witches who, because of their hatred of all those in power, vow to bring Dido down and Carthage with her. Dido, Aeneas, and their retinue take a break from a hunt in a beautiful spot, and are entertained by a telling of the story of Diana and Actaeon. The Witches conjure a storm to drive Dido back to the palace, and the Sorceress makes her "elf" appear to Aeneas as Mercury who reminds him to follow Jove's command and set sail for Italy. The third act starts with bawdy song of the sailors as they prepare to leave and the Witches enjoyment of their plan. Aeneas enters to tell Dido he must leave, and even after he tells her he'll disobey Jove's command and stay, she tells him to go because he even thought about breaking his promise and leaving her. Aeneas goes, and Dido kills herself with Aeneas' own sword/knife, and then is burned on a pyre, the flames of which Aeneas can see as he sails to Latium. - Steven Goldstein
