Violinist **Joshua Brown** has been praised by audiences and critics worldwide for his "richness of sound, elegance of reading...commitment of every moment at the service of the work..." (*La Libre*). Joshua gained international attention after winning the 2nd Prize and both Audience Awards at the 2024 Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels. Other international competition successes include the 1st Prize at the inaugural 2023 Global Music Education International Violin Competition in Beijing, China, as well as the 1st Prize and Audience Award at the 2019 International Violin Competition of Leopold Mozart in Augsburg, Germany.

Joshua was first recognized for his debut performance with the Cleveland Orchestra, of which *ClevelandClassical* wrote, "Brilliantly played and expertly paced, Brown's performance checked into every emotional corner... Brown was spellbinding throughout his entire time on stage." Joshua has gone on to perform regularly with orchestras around the world, including the Munich Radio Orchestra, MDR Sinfonieorchester, Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Chicago Civic Orchestra, East Coast Chamber Orchestra, Belgian National Orchestra, and Orchestre Philharmonique Royal de Liège, among others, continually garnering praise from critics. After his performance of Brahms' Violin Concerto in Beijing with members of the Philadelphia Orchestra, *The Strad* wrote, "Brown spun out silky, weightless phrases that seemed suspended in time;" in Belgium, *Le Soir* described him as "a real musician, of great sensitivity...with a real sense of nuance;" and the *Indianapolis Star* described his sound after a performance of Mozart's 5th Violin Concerto as "addictive and shimmering, with emotions like dynamic colors that shifted beneath a clear, glassy surface."

A passionate recitalist and chamber musician, Joshua has also appeared regularly in series such as Chicago's Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert Series, Festival Musiq3 in Brussels, the Tchaikovsky Festival in Moscow, the ProMusica series in Mexico, the Matinée Musicale series in Cincinnati, the Jupiter Chamber Players series in New York City, and the North Shore Chamber Music Festival in Chicago. Joshua received the Kronberg Academy's 2023 Manfred Grommek Prize, and has been named a Pirastro Artist, Yamaha Young Performing Artist, and Luminarts Fellow, among other awards. Upcoming highlights of the 2024/25 season include a recital tour of Taiwan and South Korea, as well as a series of performances of Beethoven's Violin Concerto with the Kyoto Symphony Orchestra in Japan.

Joshua is currently pursuing his Artist Diploma at the New England Conservatory of Music studying under Donald Weilerstein after also earning his Bachelor and Master of Music degrees there. Before his time at NEC, Joshua studied with Almita and Roland Vamos at the Music Institute of Chicago. Joshua is grateful to be playing an outstanding Nicolo Amati violin from Cremona, circa 1635-1640, on extended loan through the generosity of the Mary B. Galvin Foundation and the efforts of the Stradivari Society, a division of Bein & Fushi, Inc. The Mary B. Galvin Foundation, Inc. and the Stradivari Society support the very highest level of string playing by loaning precious antique Italian instruments to artists of exceptional talent and ability. **Josie Larsen**, a current Artist Diploma student of Bradley Williams at the New England Conservatory, is a lyric soprano from Sammamish, Washington. Recently, Josie performed as Fiordiligi in Mozart's *Così fan Tutte*, Elaine in *Later the same evening*, Rosalinda in *Die Fledermaus*, Mimi in *La Bohème*, and the Governess in *The Turn of the Screw*.

This summer Josie will be a Lehrer Fellow at Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, California. At this program she will be delighted to sing the role of Annunciata in Bolcom's *Lucrezia*. Additionally, she will be covering the role of Donna Anna in Mozart's *Don Giovanni*. Last summer Josie attended the Aspen Music Festival where she performed many opera scenes and studied the role of the Countess in Mozart's *Le Nozze di Figaro*.

Her concert performances have included Mozart's *Mass in C Minor* and *Bachianas Brasileiras No. 5* by Villa-Lobos. This April she will perform Brahms *Ein deutsches Requiem* with the NEC Philharmonia and Symphonic Choir and Maestro Hugh Wolff. Additionally, next month she will be singing "From Jewish Folk Poetry" as part of the BSO's Decoding Shostakovich series.

Josie has been heavily involved in competitions this year. Recently, she has been honored to receive third place at the New England Region of the Metropolitan Opera Laffont competition. One month later, she competed at the Shreveport Opera Singer of the Year competition and won third place and the Audience choice award. She is currently competing in two other competitions: The Jensen Foundation Vocal Competition and the Philharmonic Society of Arlington Young Artist Competition.

Josie completed her bachelor's degree at Brigham Young University in 2021 and her master's degree at The New England Conservatory in 2023, both in Vocal Performance. This May she will complete the second and final year of her Artist Diploma program. She will remain in Boston for the next year continuing to build her audition package, network, and brand. Josie's greatest joy from performing comes from the opportunity it provides to connect with others from all around the world no matter the language.

American pianist **Evren Ozel** has established himself as a musician of "refined restraint" (*Third Coast Review*), combining fluent virtuosity with probing, thoughtful interpretations. Having performed extensively in the United States and abroad, Evren is the recipient of a 2023 Avery Fisher Career Grant, 2022 Salon de Virtuosi Career Grant, and is currently represented by Concert Artists Guild as an Ambassador Prize Winner of their 2021 Victor Elmaleh Competition.

Since his debut with the Minnesota Orchestra at age 11, Ozel has been a featured soloist with the Cleveland Orchestra, Jacksonville Symphony, and The Orchestra Now at Bard College, with conductors Jahja Ling, Courtney Lewis, and Leon Botstein. In March of 2025, his first album of Mozart Concertos with the ORF Radio Symphony of Vienna and conductor Howard Griffiths will be released on Alpha Classics.

Ozel's 2024-25 season highlights include solo recitals for La Jolla Music Society, Capital Region Classical, and Cal Performances. Previously, he has performed recitals for Harvard Musical Association, Schubert Club, Chopin Society of Minnesota, and The Gilmore. Carrying a vast and varied recital repertoire, his 2023-24 season included a program ranging from Bach and Rameau to Ligeti, as well as a program of Beethoven's last three Piano Sonatas.

An esteemed chamber musician, Ozel performs alongside artists like David Finckel and Wu Han, Stella Chen, Zlatomir Fung, Paul Huang, and Peter Wiley. He spent four summers at the Marlboro Festival, and is currently a 2024-27 Bowers Program Artist for the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. His 2024-25 season includes a tour with Musicians from Marlboro, as well as CMS concerts at Alice Tully Hall.

Ozel resides in Boston, where he is currently a candidate in New England Conservatory's prestigious and highly-exclusive Artist Diploma program, under the tutelage of Wha Kyung Byun. Other important mentors include Jonathan Biss, Imogen Cooper, Richard Goode, Andras Schiff, and Mitsuko Uchida.

Yutong Sun has gained international recognition through his success in prestigious competitions worldwide. Notably, he garnered the second prize at the 19th Paloma O'Shea Santander International Piano Competition in Spain. Additionally, he won third prize at the 62nd Maria Canals International Music Competition in Barcelona (2016) and first prize at the 54th Jaén International Piano Competition (2012). He has also been honored in competitions such as the New Orleans International Piano Competition. Sun has performed at renowned venues including Salle Cortot in Paris, Palau de la Música in Barcelona, Jordan Hall in Boston, The Bolshoi Hall in Saint Petersburg, Warsaw Philharmonic Hall, National Centre for the Performing Arts in China and Shanghai Grand Theatre. His performances have been broadcast by major networks such as Bavarian Broadcasting, Polish Radio, and Spanish Radio and Television Corporation.

As a soloist, Sun has collaborated with numerous esteemed orchestras, including the Symphony Orchestra of Galicia, the City of Granada Orchestra, the RTVE Symphony Orchestra in Spain, the Saint Petersburg Philharmonic Orchestra, the National Symphony Orchestra of Ukraine, the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra, the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, the Santander Orchestra, the National Symphony Orchestra of the Dominican Republic, and the China NCPA Orchestra. He has worked with distinguished conductors such as Miguel Ángel Gómez Martínez, Paul Mann, Earl Lee, Nicholas McGegan, Matthew Kasper, Lio Kuokman, Yifan Sun, Maciej Tworek, José Trigueros, and José Molina. Sun has also appeared at prominent music festivals, including the Beethoven Easter Festival, Kissinger Sommer, and the International Holland Music Sessions.

A native of China, born in 1995, Yutong Sun is currently pursuing the prestigious Artist Diploma at the New England Conservatory under the tutelage of Professors Alexander Korsantia and Dang Thai Son. He previously studied at the Music School attached to the Central Conservatory in Beijing with Professor Hua Chang. His first piano recital CD was recorded by Naxos in 2012 and released worldwide in 2013 as part of their Laureate Series.

Apprenticed with Professor Nancy Yuen, Soprano **Dani Jingdan Zhang** received her bachelor's (Honours) and master's degree with distinction from Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts. In the Fall 2024, she began her study for the Artist Diploma in Opera Studies at the New England Conservatory under the tutelage of Professor Bradley Williams.

As one of the stars of 2019 RTHK Young Music Makers, Zhang has recorded a series of TV productions and radio broadcasts for RTHK. She has been invited to "The Sound of Art" hosted by the Hong Kong Museum of Art, RTHK's concert series "The GBA Concert Hall", and the RTHK's interview programme "Musicians' Terrace". In 2021, as a young artist, she was invited by Beijing Great Wall Cultural Festival and Shenzhen Cultural Center to perform in the concert series of Chinese and foreign classics. In the Hong Kong Cultural Centre Concert Hall, she performed Bach's Mass in B minor as a soprano soloist in collaboration with the Hong Kong Bach Choir and Orchestra. In 2022 HKU MUSE, she made her first collaboration with the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra (HK Phil), singing the soprano solo in the Fauré Requiem with Hong Kong Philharmonic Chorus and HKU Chamber Singers under the baton of Yu Long. In the 2023/24 season, when the HK Phil was celebrating its 50th anniversary, she was once again invited by the HK Phil to jointly perform soprano solo in Mendelssohn's A Midsummer Night's Dream and Poulenc's Gloria. In collaboration with Macao Orchestra and Learners Chorus, she also sang the soprano solo in Bach's Easter Oratorio and excerpts from Handel's Messiah in St. Dominic's Church, Macao. She also recently performed as soprano soloist in Carmina Burana with Sichuan Symphony Orchestra and Shinik Hahm.

Zhang made her debut with the Opera Hong Kong as Norina in Donizetti's *Don Pasquale* in the Hong Kong City Hall, followed by a successful performance as Musetta in Puccini's *La Bohème* at Hong Kong Cultural Centre Grand Theatre. Her other major operatic roles include Ilia in Mozart's *Idomeneo*, Cleopatra in Handel's *Giulio Cesare*, Nedda in Leoncavallo's *I Pagliacci* and Pamina in Mozart's *Die Zauber-flöte*. She has also performed as partial roles, such as Cunégonde (*Candide*), Micaëla (*Carmen*), Nannetta (*Falstaff*) and Dorabella (*Così fan tutte*). She was invited to sing at the concert commemorating the 20th anniversary of the Opera Hong Kong. Recently at NEC, she was the soloist in the Philharmonia's December performance of Mahler's Symphony No. 4 and will sing the title role in Monteverdi's *L'incoronazione di Poppea* in mid-April.

She has won awards in many international and national competitions, including Finalist Award in 2022 Donizetti International Singing Competition in Italy, Semi-Final Award in the 1st Sumi Jo International Singing Competition in France, First Place in the Bel Canto Professional Group Gold Award of the 2023 PREMIA International Young Artists Music Festival Competition, which also invited her to perform in the Prizewinners Gala Concert at Carnegie Hall in New York, and First Place in the 14th Chinese Golden Bell Award for Music (Hong Kong competition area).
