Cangelosi Sextet

Cangelosi is a major force in percussion composition today. With this sextet he presents a theme that passes through various time signatures and is developed by addition, subtraction and inversion. The result is a fun romp through percussion sounds and colors.

Treuting Extremes

Treuting, a member of the percussion chamber group SO Percussion, composed *Extremes* as part of a larger work called *Imaginary City. Extremes* has a very unique construction, one that uses words as a platform for form and rhythmic construction. In this case, Treuting uses the names of 4 cities and bases rhythms on the syllables of Houston, Denver, Helena and Burlington. This unconventional concept brings us a listening experience that is as exciting as it is original.

Takemitsu Rain Tree

Tōru Takemitsu was a Japanese composer and writer on aesthetics and music theory. Largely self-taught, Takemitsu was admired for the subtle manipulation of instrumental and orchestral timbre. He is known for combining elements of oriental and occidental philosophy and for fusing sound with silence and tradition with innovation. His percussion trio *Rain Tree* is considered a masterpiece in the percussion repertoire.

Rain Tree is used as a metaphor of water circulating in the cosmos, and Takemitsu employed Messiaen's modes of limited transposition in order to construct the pitch collections evocative of cosmic imagery. Takemitsu's goal as an artist was to expand the possibilities of music, and to express himself through creation of a universal language. The title was suggested by a passage from the novel *Atama no ii*, *Ame no Ki* by Kenzaburo Oe: "It has been named the 'rain tree' for its abundant foliage continues to let fall rain drops collected from last night's shower until well after the following midday. Its hundreds of thousands of tiny leaves - finger-like - store up moisture while other trees dry up at once. What an ingenious tree, isn't it?"

Toru Takemitsu during an interview (1993):

"My music is like a garden, and I am the gardener. Listening to my music can be compared to walking through a garden and experiencing the changes in light, pattern, and texture. I do not like to emphasize too much with my music. Someone once criticized my music as getting to be very old fashioned. Maybe I am old, but I am looking back to the past with nostalgia. Composers are sometimes afraid to use tonality, but we can use anything from the tonal to the atonal -- this is our treasure. I can say that because I am Japanese!"

Akiho Pillar I

Pillar I is one movement of the eleven movement piece *Pillars* by trailblazing composer Andy Akiho. This genre-defying monumental work is groundbreaking in its use of sounds and rhythms and requires rhythmic precision of the highest order while taking the listener on a sonic journey of epic proportion. The composer writes:

"The inspirations for this work are deeply personal, and it was written for the performers more than the instruments.... The piece does not have a concrete narrative, although I have a personal storyline that fits my life journey, and I encourage the listener to experience the music in their own adventure."

Lesemann Strike Zone

Frederick (Rick) Lesemann was as extremely admired composer in the Los Angeles area. He served on the faculty at USC for many years and was the recipient of grants and awards too numerous to list. His contributions to the composition department included an early interest in electronic music.

The NECPG presents tonight his piece entitled *Strike Zone*, written in 1995 for the USC Percussion Ensemble and director Erik Forrester. This somewhat minimalist work mixes pitched and non-pitched instruments in a mesmerizing puzzle that weaves in and out of the listener's conscious. With its interesting sonic explorations and development of scales and arpeggios, Lesemann presents us with a fascinating dialogue of the percussive vocabulary.
