#### **Zhok With Sensors**

The Yiddish dance tradition is a dynamic conversation between dancer and musician. The klezmer band strikes up a lively, mournful, or yearning tune and the dancer, in turn, responds with gestures and steps. What often goes unnoticed is the subtle response of the band to the dancer, the adjustment of tempo, feel, and dynamics to the dancer's gestures.

Sampling and remixing archival Yiddish music in an electronic context allows for archival recordings to come to life both in both traditional (i.e. Jewish cultural institutions) and untraditional (i.e. nightclubs) spaces. However, especially when working with dancers, simply playing a sample of an archival recording can feel stagnant. The conversation between dancer and musician is lost.

*Zhok With Sensors* seeks to demonstrate one way to re-dynamize the conversation between dancer and klezmer in the context of archival recordings. With a sensor attached to each foot, the dancer is able to control the rhythms of a traditional dance tune (a *zhok*), triggering each beat as they step.

The recording presented in this performance is a remix of Belf's Romanian Orchestra's *Bolgarski Zhok*, recorded at some point between 1911 and 1914. The dancer manipulates the recording, allowing Belf's Romanian Orchestra to accompany her movements. In doing so, *Zhok With Sensors* bridges the century between the original recording and the embodied present of Yiddish dance, reviving the mutual listening at the heart of Yiddish dance. – *Kaia Berman Peters*
