Yan Orchid

Since ancient times, people in China have loved, nurtured and praised orchids, poetically depicting them in poems, songs, and paintings. Typically grown in harsh

environments, they traditionally bloom only during the winter season. They are strong, honorable, and unafraid of winter's snow and frost. They do not compete with other flowers, and they do not require careful attention from gardeners. Akin to hermits in the floral realm, they symbolize purity and perseverance. Inspired by this idealized vision of their character, I composed *Orchid*. I do not seek to create striking contrasts in pitch, motivic development, timbre, dynamics, or tempo in this work. Instead, a sense of restraint is felt throughout. In the first section, I use simple melodic material to capture the essence of the orchids' nobility. In the second section, I focus more on developing the harmony. Although freedom and flexibility are cultivated in the music, a sense of discipline is also maintained throughout. – *Yan Yan*

Throughout the two years, I've explored other genres seeking to extend my capabilities as a composer.
